



Have you looked at your receipts lately? You should! You might notice a 25-cent charge for each paper bag, and a 5-cent California Redemption Value (CRV) charge for each can, plastic bottle, or glass bottle of your favorite drinks. January 1, 2024 stores started charging 10 to 25 cents CRV on your bottle or box of spirits. If you currently redeem your CRV at the Ben Lomond Transfer Station, it's time to make a change to save money, time, and gas costs for those trips to Ben Lomond.

Next time you visit the store, ask how to redeem your CRV items and get ready for more saving, and less driving. When you head to the market or store, place your emptied CRV items in your reuseable bag. Returning 24 cans or empty bottles at 5 cents each would bring you \$1.20; returning more cans, bottles, box wine, pouches and other redeemable CRV containers brings even more that you can use towards your purchase. Bringing your reusable bags saves you more, and every penny counts!

As of July 1, 2025 the Ben Lomond Transfer Station CRV redemption center will not be available for CRV redemption. However, starting January 1, 2025 any beverage retailer will have to either join a dealer cooperative or offer in-store redemption to customers. Don't wait to cash in! Do it weekly when you go shopping. Most places such as supermarkets will refund up to 50 cans or bottles so stay current to prevent a pile up.

SWAP SINGLE-USE TO REUSABLE

Even one simple swap from single-use to reusable can make a difference in reducing trash:

SANTA CRUZ COUNTY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) PROGRAM

Many common household products are legally defined as hazardous. If a product label has the words danger, caution, poison or "handle with care" then it's likely HHW. Items such as batteries, cell phones, computers, smoke detectors, solar panels and propane cylinders can pose a threat to human health, animals, and the environment when improperly used or disposed. Hazardous items cannot be disposed in the trash or recycling. The Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program with trained professionals provides the only proper way to dispose of hazardous products when they are no longer wanted.

HHW Collection Facilities are open FREE OF CHARGE to residents of the unincorporated County of Santa Cruz and the Cities of Scotts Valley, Capitola and Santa Cruz. Please bring proof of residency with you (e.g. driver license, utility bill). For locations and hours of operation, check our website at www.santacruzcountyrecycles.org.

When you buy batteries, check if they are alkaline or lithium. Knowing what type of battery you are buying can help you to know how to dispose of your used batteries. Always tape the two terminals on a 9-volt battery, and both ends of lithium batteries. If terminals touch each other or other metal, they could spark a reaction.





SANTA CRUZ COUNTY TAKE BACK PROGRAM

The Santa Cruz County Take Back Program allows you to take back certain hazardous items to a retail location for disposal, to save you a trip to the HHW Collection Facility.

Fluorescent Light Bulbs

NEVER throw your used fluorescent bulbs in the trash or recycling! Locate a drop-off retailer at www.santacruzcountyrecycles.org

Limit: 10 bulbs per day. Compact fluorescents and tubes up to 4' length accepted.
